Safety Tips

Cutting Wood

Firewood season is finally here! When using a saw, it is important to use it safely. Here are some tips on cutting wood:

- . Make sure you are wearing the proper PPE.
 - . Safety glasses, proper foot wear, gloves, ear plugs/ muffs if you are using a chainsaw, etc.
- Avoid alcohol and drugs when cutting wood.
- . Make sure you know how to use a saw/chainsaw safely and properly.
- . Avoid distractions.
- . Make sure there are no nails or screws in the wood.
 - . If you try to cut a nail or screw, you can potentially damage your saw.

Moose Awareness!

Why Moose use Roadways

Roadways often run through areas of prime moose habitat. More importantly, roads tend to attract moose which come there to:

- feed on the vegetation along the roadside
- gain relief from flies in the open windswept right- of-ways
- in winter, to travel roadways cleared of deep snow
- move from one part of the habitat to another



Prevention

As long as there are moose in Newfoundland, they will be found on the highway.

Data show that even in areas with very low moose density, moose are still attracted

to roadways and can pose a hazard to drivers

Whistles, reflectors, and odour repellents to frighten big game from passing vehicles or keep them from roadsides have been tested in North America and Europe; so far none have proven to be effective or economically feasible.

Care and attention when driving remains your best defense against a moose-vehicle accident.

How to Avoid an Accident

- Pay attention and avoid distractions.
- Slow down when driving at night.
- Scan both sides of the road.
- · Keep your headlights and windshields clean.
- When driving at night, make sure your high beams are on unless you are approaching another vehicle.
- Moose are unpredictable. The moose you see standing calmly at the edge of the road could bolt in front of your vehicle at the last moment.
- Pay attention to road signs. They mark high-risk areas of wildlife.
